Description

Do you ever wonder how to manage in cases of cultural conflicts or in anticipation of misunderstandings that inevitably arise in human interactions? Wonder what to say in exchanges that go beyond the realm of your life or professional experiences in bereavement care? Or simply desire to increase your "self" and "other" cultural awareness, knowledge, and skills? Do you question how to appropriately support within and across cultural lines at arguably the most vulnerable phase of life?

During this interactive workshop, we will explore *Cultural Humility* in meeting the diverse needs of contemporary families in *end-of-life and after-death care* from a developmental and contextual perspective. The speaker draws from research, practice, and case studies. Dr. Bordere will enlighten the audience on cultural humility, providing practical experiences that allow for self-reflection and problem-solving in a safe and community environment; and from the presenter's culture to yours. She will conclude with a unique grief ritual grounded in the celebratory context of New Orleans.

The Tri-State Conference on Grief and Loss is the result of the collaborative efforts of several bereavement professionals in the Greater Cincinnati area. Our goal is to offer a one day program featuring a nationally recognized speaker to local bereavement providers in an affordable venue.

Audience

Aftercare providers, bereavement specialists, child life specialists, chaplains, clergy, counselors, educators, funeral directors, nurses, social workers, and anyone who works with the bereaved.

Objectives

- Define cultural humility and examine its applications to effectively work with bereaved individuals and families approaching end-of-life and after-death care.
- Critically evaluate social justice theories and concepts, including privilege, oppression, suffocated grief, and alliance building as related to diversity in grief and mourning within and across groups.
- Describe culture and the intersection of variables through "self" and "other" reflective activities to uncover strengths and barriers in work with bereaved families.
- Examine and become equipped with strategies grounded in cultural humility and culturally conscientious practice for effective work and trust-building with individuals and families in both normative or socially sanctioned (e.g., health) and in disenfranchising death, loss and grief encounters.

Tashel C. Bordere, PhD, CT, is an Associate Professor of Child and Family Development at the University of Central Missouri, where she has developed and taught courses related to Death, Dying and Bereavement in Families, Multiculturalism in Families, and Adolescent Culture. She is also a member of the National Council on Family Relations. She is a speaker, youth advocate, researcher and author of works relating to diversity and resilience through grief. She was a panelist on the 2014 Annual Hospice Teleconference "Helping Adolescents Cope With Loss."

Dr. Bordere is a board member of the Association of Death Education and Counseling (ADEC) and past Chair of ADEC's People of Color/Multicultural Forum. As an active member of ADEC, Tashel contributed her service and expertise as the former editor of *The Forum*, the association's quarterly member publication. She is a Certified Thanatologist.

Tashel has provided numerous consultations, trainings, presentations and workshops across the country relating to cultural awareness and sensitivity in practice with youth affected by violent death. Her research focuses on homicidal violent death among African-American youth, cultural death customs, parenting approaches within context, and culturally sensitive practices in research and work with children and adolescents.
