Advanced Communication Life Support (ACLS)—Reviving your Public Speaking Skills

Description: This interactive workshop is aimed at helping participants to resuscitate their own public speaking skills and to learn practical ways to train others as well. Small and large group activities will focus on developing a personal toolkit that includes composing audience-centered titles and learning objectives, creating engaging presentations, incorporating audience participation, and practicing key skills.

Beyond PowerPoint as a Didactic Tool: Leveraging Neuroscience to Enhance Education of Adult Learners
