Description: In healthcare professional education, we are taught standard approaches to many tasks such as reading an EKG, giving a medication, or conducting a handoff. However, most healthcare educators are never taught a standard approach to asking questions of their learners in clinical situations. This creates an illusion that any question-asking is "good teaching". This workshop will review the meanings of terms such as "Socratic method" and "pimping", and provide a framework for asking questions of learners using a known cognitive taxonomy.
