SUMMIT PURPOSE

The purpose of the Annual Regional Perinatal Summit is to bring together clinical and public health leaders to review and discuss current perinatal issues, data, and ideas that can be addressed to improve pregnancy outcomes within the region.

SUMMIT DESCRIPTION

Of late, a great deal of attention has focused on the opioid crisis and substance use effects on the infant. Yet, maternal mood disorders are often intertwined in the pregnant woman's psychosocial history both with illicit substance using and non-illicit substance using women. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) 2016-2017 National Survey on Drug Use and Health reports 3.5 % of those 18+ using illicit drugs in the past year compared to 18.57% of the 18+ population reporting any mental illness in the past year. Hence, this year's Summit, "Maternal Mood Disorders & Neonatal Consequences", will spotlight psychiatric illness during pregnancy and the effects on the infant, both medically and developmentally.
